Special Educational Needs Code (SEN) 2014

The Government has introduced SEN reforms to schools that come into effect in September 2014 (Children and Families Bill). The reforms aim to streamline support for children and young people aged 0-25 and focus on delivering positive outcomes for them.

You will notice some changes which will include the terms used to refer to children with special needs and also to some of the records that are kept in schools. Schools in the Cheddar Valley are committed to supporting the progress of all students and to working in partnership with families.

Definition of SEN and the Highlighted Needs Register

The Government's definition of SEN in the new SEN Code of Practice is: 'A child has SEN if they have a learning difficulty or disability which calls for 'special educational provision' to be made for them and they have significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of others of the same age.'

As a result you may find that students who were previously classed on the school's SEN register as having 'Special Educational Needs' will now be referred to by Cheddar Valley Schools as being on the **Highlighted Needs** Register. They may still take part in additional interventions, but these may not be 'special educational provision'. If this is the case for your child, please be reassured that staff will still be required to ensure that lessons meet their needs and that effective 'personalised' provision is made for them. This is called 'Quality First Teaching' and is the most effective way for the vast majority of students to access their learning.

SEN Support

A smaller number of students will remain on the SEN register and all these students will now be referred to as requiring 'SEN support'. The interventions to meet their needs will be more specialised and will require the advice and supervision of the school's Special Educational Needs Coordinator (SENCo). The progress they make on these interventions and in their education as a whole will be reviewed termly with parents.

Education, Health and Care Plans

Some students with very complex needs will have Education Health and Care Plans. This is the term for the documents that will replace statements. The government hopes to encourage Health, Social Care and Local Authority agencies to work together to meet the needs of these students. More information regarding these arrangements can be found on
